POLITICAL PLATFORMS –

a formal set of principle goals or ideals which are supported by a political party or individual candidate, in order to appeal to the general public, for the ultimate purpose of garnering the general public's support and votes about complicated topics or issues

- <u>The Ninety-Five Theses</u> of <u>Martin Luther</u> in 1517, opposed practices of the <u>Catholic Church</u> at that time (both a religion and a political territory), and led to the establishment of Protestantism
- <u>Thomas Paine</u>'s pamphlet <u>Common Sense</u> (1776) advocated freedom from the rule of <u>Great Britain</u> for the <u>American Colonists</u> and proposed a constitution for the new United States
- <u>Friedrich Engels</u> and <u>Karl Marx</u>'s 1848 <u>Communist Manifesto</u>, called for the abolition of <u>private property</u> and applied a <u>scientific understanding</u> to the development of society through <u>socialism</u> into a society without money-usage, social classes, or state coercion, which would be called "<u>communism</u>"
